







Childcare and Parenting Resources

General Resources

For parents with younger children, both institutional and third-party daycare centers are available in the neighborhood surrounding the Tri-Institutional campuses. We recommend that you begin your research as soon as possible, because many childcare centers have considerable waiting lists, especially for infants. Some families choose to hire a nanny to provide in-home or after-school care. For nursing mothers, all three institutions also provide access to lactation rooms, as is required under NYC law.

As children progress to preschool and primary school, additional resources will help parents navigate the myriad options available. Be on the lookout for workshops offered by the institutions to help guide parents through these processes.

Institution-Associated Childcare Centers

Weill Cornell Children's Center (Bright Horizons, 409 East 60th Street)

Provides childcare for the children of Weill Cornell faculty, staff, postdocs, and students. They accommodate children aged 6 weeks to 5 years old. Tuition for full-time (up to 9 hours per day) is on a sliding scale based on household income. Limited spaces are available.

Rockefeller University Child and Family Center (CFC, on the RU campus)

Students pursuing thesis research in RU labs are eligible for childcare at the RU CFC. They accommodate children aged 3 months to 5 years old. Tuition is on a sliding scale. The CFC operates like a school with an academic calendar (September-August), which means that children generally start in September and join a class that later move up to higher "grades" together (i.e.: infant, toddler, preschool).

William Woodward, Jr. Nursery School (Payson House, 435 East 70th Street)

The William Woodward, Jr. Nursery School is a private, independent, not-for-profit nursery school with children entering at ages 2–4 years old. Families affiliated with the following hospitals are given preference: New York Presbyterian, Weill Cornell Medical College, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center (MSKCC), Hospital for Special Surgery (HSS).

Play Area Association (PAA, Payson House, 435 East 70th Street)

The PAA is open to families of New York-Presbyterian Hospital, Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, Hospital for Special Surgery, Rockefeller University, WCMC, their affiliate institutions, and alumni of these training programs. The PAA sponsors a Play-and-Learn Co-op for children 2–5 years old and also offers indoor and outdoor play areas, discounted children's enrichment classes, weekly playgroups for toddlers, field trips, and fun parties for PAA families throughout the year. Annual membership is \$230/family.

- Look for postings on bulletin boards & laundry rooms in your apartment buildings

Backup Child Care

The institutions offer backup child care at Bright Horizons Centers when a child's regular childcare center or school is closed, or other accommodations are needed. There is also an option for Bright Horizons to provide a babysitter for in-home care at your residence. Typically, the family will pay a daily fee and the institution will cover a certain number of days per year for each child or family. Advance registration is required.

NYC Public Schools

NYC guarantees free public school for all children residing in NYC. Families moving to NYC should contact a Department of Education Family Welcome Center for assistance with school placement. Preschool may be available in the calendar year a child turns 3 through the NYC 3-K program, although enrollment is limited in District 2 that encompasses the Upper East Side. NYC offers universal Pre-K in the calendar year a child turns 4, with a guaranteed seat and priority by zone and district, although it may not be in your immediate neighborhood. NYC students begin Kindergarten in the calendar year they turn 5, and students generally receive a seat in the zoned school in their neighborhood. Students may also qualify for Gifted & Talented programs based on testing in the spring before entering kindergarten; however, this program is currently being phased out by NYC and its future remains uncertain. Students may also apply to the publicly-funded Hunter College Elementary School, which offers entry at Kindergarten only based on two phases of testing; admissions are extremely competitive.
